Escape into Reading!



In today's world of screens and technology, it's easy for books to take a back seat. Yet, reading remains one of the most powerful tools for learning, imagination, and success. Regular reading at home doesn't just improve vocabulary and comprehension—it builds confidence, creativity, and a lifelong love of learning.

We know that many children are drawn to games and apps, but sharing a book with an adult can create special moments which have a significant impact on a child's interest in reading. Whether it's a bedtime story, a chapter before dinner, a visit to Ashford library or simply talking about a favourite character, these moments matter. They show children that reading is not a chore—it's an adventure you can enjoy together.

Developing our children's enjoyment of books and of reading for pleasure is a key development action for us at Godinton this year. As part of this, we are embarking on an exciting project led by the Kingsnorth Reading Hub, a Department for Education funded project, based Kingsnorth Primary School which develops initiatives for reading and phonics in schools across the South East. The hub is running a programme this academic year in which they are encouraging all schools in the Ashford area to engage with an audit process to gain a Reading Charter bronze award. The process to gaining the award, encourages schools to be reflective on the practices in place to create a whole school reading culture where reading is prioritised, celebrated and accessible to all, ensuring that every child becomes a confident, fluent and passionate reader.

Over the course of the year we will be facilitating activities and events to promote reading for pleasure and develop our children's reading skills further. We very much value the opportunity to do this in partnership with parents and have already, this year, offered activities to help parents understand more about phonics at Godinton, such as the sessions for our Year 1 parents in which they saw a phonics lesson being taught to the class by our Year 1 teachers.

Our challenge to our families over the coming months is to make time for reading every day. Even 10 minutes can make a huge difference.

Why Reading at Home Matters — And How You Can Make It Fun!

Children who read regularly develop stronger vocabulary, improved oracy, better comprehension, and a love of stories that lasts a lifetime.

Reading doesn't have to be a solo activity - sharing books with an adult at home can make a significant difference to a child's love of reading. When children see that reading is valued and enjoyed both at school and by their family, they are far more likely to embrace it themselves.

Why is reading at home so important?

- It builds language skills and strengthens school learning.
- It sparks creativity and imagination.
- It improves focus and empathy.

Our Year 4 and Year 6 pupils successfully completed their **Bikeability cycling training** this month, developing essential skills for safe and confident cycling.

Year 4 focused on mastering the basics in the safety of the school playground. They learned how to start and stop with control, and practiced balance and steering. These skills are the foundation for becoming responsible cyclists.

Year 6 took their training to the next level by heading out onto local roads. Under the guidance of qualified instructors, they learned how to signal, navigate junctions, and ride safely in real traffic conditions. This experience is invaluable in preparing them for independent cycling and promoting road safety.

We are incredibly proud of all our children for their enthusiasm and determination. A big thank you to the Cycle Circle team for delivering such valuable training. Cycling is not only a great way to stay active but also an important life skill—and now our children are ready to ride with increased confidence.
